Participant Projects' Coming to Fruition

Thursday 26th May saw the launch and inaugural meeting of the Gippsland Public Affairs and Marketing Network at PowerWorks. The drive for the Network has come from several people including Neil Lawson (2004) who listed it as his community project for his GCLP year.

Neil was assisted by Gerald May from Loy Yang Power and Chris Buckingham (1999) from Go To.... Twenty five public relations and communication professionals from Warragul to Sale to South Gippy attended the launch including Justin Kohlman (2003), Pam Dyson (2004) and Dan Clancey (2004).

The Network addressed issues of structure and an ongoing charter in its inaugural meeting and planned future meetings with guest speakers for 2005. Importantly the feedback from the first meeting has been excellent with a very positive endorsement of the Network's aims and aspirations. It is also envisaged that the PR network will assist in helping achieve the aims of strengthening the established networks and professional relationships within Gippsland.
